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Alexander of Foigny

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Alexander of Foigny († 1229)

1. Name variants: A. of Laon, A. of Scotland
2. Places: Foigny, Fontaines des Fièvres
3. Biography: A. and his sister, Mathilde de Lappion, were said to be children of the king of Scots by contemporary sources. A. left Scotland with his sister and became a lay brother at Foigny where he remained until his death in 1229. Cantimpré's account is less historically accurate and more fanciful, claiming A. fled to avoid taking up the crown of Scotland, which had been left to him because his three older brothers joined religious orders or took vows of some kind. This description would not fit any son of a king of Scotland at this time though.
4. Cultus: A. was venerated locally at Foigny's abbey-chapel and at the nearby Fontaines des Fièvres and at the Tree of the Virgin; several miracles such as healing the sick were said to have happened at A.'s tomb and other nearby sites.
 - a. Relics: Relics were reported to be in the abbey's chapel in Foigny until its destruction after 1797 (Le Bienheureux Alexandre de Foigny, 21).
 - b. Liturgical commemoration: 3 May, 4 May (Le Bienheureux Alexandre de Foigny, 30).
 - c. Patronage: Patron of the graziers of Thiérache.
