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Alrad of Eldingen

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Alrad of Eldingen (* ca. 1200 – † before 1259)

1. Name variants: Alradus of Riddagshausen

2. Places: Riddagshausen, Isenhagen, Marienrode, Eldingen

3. Biography: Lay brother A. was first mentioned in an official document from the Augustinian convent Katlenburg in 1231. It is likely that he was a member of the Cistercian monastery Riddagshausen near Braunschweig. In 1243, he probably moved with part of the Riddagshausen convent to the newly founded monastery Isenhagen. A. must have died there. In 1259, the convent moved his remains from Isenhagen to its new foundation Marienrode (formerly called Backenrode). Cistercian nuns re-occupied the abandoned monastery Isenhagen in 1265, apparently without memory of A. The 15th c. chronicles of Marienrode describe A. as a noble knight who turned from a secular soldier into a pious recruit of Christ. It is mentioned that he received visions and revelations, as well as performing miracles. Pilgrims came in large numbers to A.'s burial site at Marienrode. The cult continued until the suppression of the monastery in 1806.
