Mónika Tímár (* 21 Mar 1937 – † 13 Dec 1962)

1. Name variants: M. Schmidt

2. Places: Budapest

3. Biography: In 1955, M. joined a clandestine monastic community of three young women living under the direction of one Cistercian nun in a Budapest apartment. All worked day jobs to avoid alarming the communist government. The community grew and M. became novice mistress shortly after her first vows in 1958. After the superior, two sisters, and a chaplain were imprisoned in February 1961, the eight remaining sisters unanimously elected M. as their superior. She fulfilled her calling with love and discretion. She died suddenly from hepatitis, having offered her life to the imprisoned. Her community later became the Abbey of Kismaros.

a. Relics: Her grave is marked in the Farkasréti cemetery in Budapest.

c. Patronage: Venerated in the congregation of Zirc, in Hans Urs von Balthasar's Community of St. John, and the Focolare movement. Suitable patron for young superiors, contemplative life in urban contexts, lovers of nature and poetry.
